Fifty-Fourth Legislature - First General Session

February 9, 2019

This is not a drill!

We need all hands on deck. Outside interests are pushing more ESA voucher bills, and lawmakers need to hear from us. SB1320 removes oversight of the program from the Department of Education (and newly-elected Superintendent Hoffman, who ran on a platform of improving ESA oversight). SB1395 expands vouchers, mere months after we rejected expansion by a 2:1 margin!

Good and mad yet? Speak up! Your calls, emails, and RTS positions truly make an impact. Show up to the committee hearings listed below to make our opposition impossible to ignore. **Good bills need our support NOW and bad bills need to die this week.**

Oppose SB1320



- Voters just rejected this exact same proposal via Prop. 305 respect the voters!
- It is irresponsible and harmful to take a complex education program out of the hands of educators and expect accountants to work with families on curriculum, therapies and more.
- Lawmakers want to champion ESA accountability? Then have the Legislature release the \$6 million earmarked for ESA oversight that its been withholding from ADE for years.

Oppose SB1395



- Hands tax dollars to a third-party for-profit vendor promoted by national special interests to privatize and profit from education funding.
- Eliminates what few standards are currently in place: re-evaluation of recipients, allowable goods and services, and more, opening the floodgates for even more fraud and abuse!
- Proposes "fixes" that are already in place meaning no actual improvements, just political games.
- Expands vouchers to even more people who aren't already eligible via the existing 6 categories. For the cheap seats: AZ voted NO NEW VOUCHERS!

Support HB2185



- Welcome reform to a private school tax-credit program that has ballooned to divert hundreds of millions of dollars away from the state budget every year.
- Current recipients and donors aren't affected this just slows growth to a more reasonable rate of 2 percent per year.

Support SB1168



- Caps the growth of student tuition organization (STO) vouchers at 2% or inflation, whichever is larger, and lower the administration fee from 10% to 5%.
- A growth cap is important because STO donations topped \$1 billion in 2017 and are paid for by dollar-for-dollar tax credits from the state's general fund.
- If left to grow according to current law, by 2030, our state will spend more on these tax credits for corporations than those same corporations will be paying into our state budget.
